



President's Report

 $oldsymbol{\mathsf{A}}$ fter almost 18 months of lockdowns and covid-19 restrictions things are finally starting to look up for musicians with gigs and cross border work increasing. With vaccination rates up and the number of cases and

deaths down we're cautiously optimistic that we're on the road to a slow but steady resurgence. Larry Feudo At one point we lost close to 250 members and that created some real problems in operating the local. We've had to renegotiate our office insurance, phone and internet and cut back on our hours of operation. With all the savings from this

and keeping a lid on spending we were able to weather the storm and continue providing excellent service for our members. Our livestream program at the Casbah dubbed The Hamilton Musicians` Guild Music Festival was a phenomenal success. Featuring

25 acts over 13 days the festival employed 129 musicians with the grand finale being a 26 piece New Millennium Orchestra led by Charles Cozens on the last day.

We received generous funding from the MPTF and the AFM's Freelance Co-Funding Program. We also got significant funding from local sponsors like the Friends of Richard Newell (King Biscuit Boy), Findlay Law, Next Steps Financial Planning, Picks and Sticks and Long and McQuade. Without all their support we would not have been able to employ so many musicians. We owe them all our gratitude for their generosity, which speaks highly of the Local's standing in the community.

The livestreams generated a lot of attention for the Local and Graham Rockingham of The Spec gave us a great write-up. This translated into a lot of viewers for the livestreams and our Facebook page's numbers went through the roof. Our membership numbers rose by 35 members since our last quarter.

On another positive note we have concluded contract negotiations for the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra in just two sessions. The Negotiating Committee has recommended that the Orchestra ratify the contract which was very favourable to both management and players. We'd like to thank the executive director of the HPO Kim Varian for bargaining in good faith and for fostering a good working partnership. Also, thanks to the negotiating committee for their hard work and their sincere efforts to contribute to the success of the HPO. Both Secretary Treasurer Brent Malseed and I are so proud to maintain the successful relationship with the HPO management, a rare thing these days.

Also, on June 16th Hamilton City Council voted in favour of using our pay scales as a guide for fair payment to all musicians playing City of Hamilton events. This sets a North American city precedent that has drawn lots of attention from our peers in the AFM. Check out the full article on page 12 of May 2021 Issue of the AFM International Musician Magazine - American Federation of Musicians (afm.org). There is also an article that was printed on July 7, 2021 in the Hamilton Spectator on page 16 of this Libretto by Spec Reporter Jeff Mahoney entitled "New policy ensures fair wages for musicians at city of Hamilton-led Events".

If any of our members need help paying dues, or have fallen to injury or illness please contact the Local as we have some resources available. I'd like to thank all those members who've kept up their membership because they believe in the work we're doing. All the letters of support are very much appreciated by myself and the entire board and it is gratifying to know the majority of our members are in it for the long haul.

Starting September 1st we are launching a membership drive to encourage new members and former members by waiving the Federation and Local's initiation fees. This will be offered only until the end of the year. I'd like to thank the entire board for always stepping up and being there when it counts.

Lastly, on a sad note we lost President Emeritus and Lifetime Achievement Award winner Matt Kennedy. He was an exemplary musician and lifelong supporter of the Hamilton Musicians' Guild who always pitched in to help. I will never forget the first Guild meeting I attended where Matt reached out to me and made me feel welcome - he was a true gentleman and a great resource for the Guild.. Be sure to read Secretary-Treasurer Brent Malseed's article in this issue of the Libretto Yours in solidarity, for some interesting history.

Report of the Secretary-Treasurer

Since the outbreak of Covid-19 in 2020, the workload at the office has been extremely busy trying to keep all members informed of lobbying efforts by the American Federation of Musicians and the Canadian Federation of Musicians working with other entertainment labour organizations to get musicians, actors, stage hands, etc recognized to be included in legislation for CERB funding from the Federal Government. At the local level, the Hamilton Musicians' Guild has also worked closely with the City of Hamilton's Music Advisory Team (HMAT), which is an advisory committee to Hamilton City Council that advocates City Council on behalf of a group of local music industry representatives. HMG293 2nd Vice-President Janna Malseed has been involved with the Hamilton's Music Stategy since 2016 and is a member of the Hamilton Music Advisory Team (HMAT) and held the position of co-chair for several years and still is an active member of the committee. President Larry Feudo and myself with support of

HMAT made a presentation to a sub-committee of the General Issues Committee of the Mayors Task Force on Economic Recovery for the city of Hamilton on August 21, 2020 that supported recommendations for a minimum wages scale for musicians hired by the City and at City related/sanctioned events. A Motion was presented by the General Issues Committee to Hamilton City Council for adoption February 17, 2021 and became a city policy in June, 2021 - see Hamilton Spectator article on page16 of this Libretto.

Remembering Matt Kennedy

My good friend and musical mentor Matt Kennedy has passed. Matt served on the Hamilton Musicians' Guild Executive Board in various positions for over 40 years including 10 years as President before he decided to step down. He was then appointed as President Emeritus and held that position for over another 20 years until his death. Matt used to say - "Don't be so sad – let's be glad we had this time to spend together."

Matt joined the Hamilton Musicians' Guild in 1947. From the "Jam Sessions" Sunday afternoons at the Moose Hall in

Hamilton in the years immediately following WW II, to the Jack Ryan Orchestra at the El Morocco, Johnny Mario Band (co-led with Fred Purser) in 1950 at the Royal Connaught Hotel, Morgan Thomas and Alf Borsellino Bands, to a lengthy sojourn with Gav Morton at the Brant Inn in Burlington, the keyboard prowess of Matt Kennedy was well-entrenched in the Hamilton-Burlington area as an amazing jazz pianist.

As the Big Band era came to an end, smaller jazz groups found new performance venues in coffee houses and jazz clubs. Matt could be found playing regularly with various groups of this genre.

In the 1950's and into the 1980's, CHCH TV in Hamilton was producing numerous live shows which provided work for AFM Local 293 musicians, and Matt

was very active in this area. Matt composed the theme song for CHCH's Tiny Talent Time which was played at the beginning and end of every show. He also backed up many young performers during the CHCH production.











In addition, Matt was performing regularly at the Burlington Golf Club and later in the 70's and 80's performing 5 nights a week at the Royal Connaught Hotel in the O'Sullivan's dining room. During the 80's many artists, performing at Hamilton Place, would stay at the Connaught Hotel and would come for dinner and drinks at O'Sullivan's and enjoyed the Matt Kennedy Trio including Nana Mouskouri. Burton Cummings, the Gatlin Brothers, Tony Bennett, Leonard Cohen, Bruce Cockburn, Céline Dion, Gordon Lightfoot, Murray McLauchlan, Alanis Morissette, and Anne Murray, among many others.

In 1975, I was very fortunate to be asked to play bass on 7 songs for an LP Album (50 Years

Together featuring the Washington's) with Matt Kennedy and Fred Purser and the Washington's with Sam Noto on trumpet at Berkley Studios in Toronto. The other 6 cuts on the LP were recorded live on an earlier date at Olivet United Church in Hamilton with Lloyd Stapleton on bass and Graham Topping on trumpet. This LP was a recording of six (6) standard jazz tunes as well as seven (7) original jazz songs composed and arranged by Norm Tufts.

Frank Sinatra was a life time supporter of the American Federation of Musicians of the United States and Canada.

Membership Stats

Eighteen (18) months ago, before the Covid-19 Pandemic knocked the entertainment industry to its knees, the Hamilton Musicians' Guild membership stood at over 700 active members. As of the writing of this Libretto, the membership of the Hamilton Musicians' Guild, AFM Local 293 (CFM) currently stands at 495 active members, however, since the beginning of 2021, Local 293 has had 25 new members join the local and 33 members have reinstated their memberships. Covid has had a major effect of the membership of the American Federation of Musicians of the United States and Canada (AFM). Since the beginning of Covid, the total AFM membership has dropped by 12,725 members including 4,016 members from twenty-five (25) Locals of the Canadian Federation of Musicians.

Union Involvement

I first got involved with Local 293 in the late 70's and was elected to the Executive Board in 1979. The Music Industry has always been a passion in my and Janna's lives and after much discussion, we have decided that we will not be seeking re-election at the upcoming Nomination Membership Meeting on October 12, 2021. I will continue to help in the office operations and service the members until the end of my term on December 31, 2021.

I would like to thank all the members of Local 293 for their support over the years as well as the support and advice from other elected officers from other locals across Canada and the United States. The staff at the Canadian Office and the Federation office in New York were instrumental in our efforts to rebuild the Hamilton Musicians' Guild. There is not enough room in this report to mention the names of all the individuals who guided and mentored me in my journey as an activist in the union movement. My passion for music is still vibrant and I will continue my journey in life as a freelance musician.

I would also like to take this opportunity to advise all members that Glen Brown and Brenda Brown will also not be seeking re-election to the Executive Board at the upcoming Local 293 Nominations Meeting on Tuesday, October 12, 2021. I would like to thank Glen and Brenda for all their help and support over the years as Directors of the Hamilton Musicians' Guild.

To end my report, I would like to share a quote by David Ackert that was printed a few years ago in the L.A. Times:

"Musicians are some of the most driven, courageous people on the face of the earth. They deal with more day-to-day rejection in one year than most people do in a lifetime. Every day, they face the financial challenge of living a freelance lifestyle, the disrespect of people who think they should get real jobs, and their own fear that they'll never work again. Every day, they have to ignore the possibility that the vision they have dedicated their lives to is a pipe dream. With every note, they stretch themselves, emotionally and physically, risking criticism and judgement. With every passing year, many of them watch as the other people their age achieve the predictable milestones of normal life - the car, the family, the house, the nest egg. Why? Because musicians are willing to give their entire lives to a moment – to that melody, that lyric, that chord, or that interpretation that will stir the audience's soul. Musicians are beings who have tasted life's nectar in that crystal moment when they poured out their creative spirit and touched another's heart. In that instant, they were as close to magic, God, and perfection as anyone could ever be. And in their own hearts, they know that to dedicate oneself to that moment is worth a thousand lifetimes."

Local 293 StreetBeat

The Article below is a reprint of an interview by Paul Panchezak with Matt Kennedy from the November 2017 Libretto

At the recent Canadian Conference held in Hamilton our Local 293 past president Matt Kennedy was honoured with a Lifetime Achievement Award from the CFM/AFM. In this month's Streetbeats I thought I'd take the opportunity to ask Matt a few questions so that our younger members can get to know him better. His answers give us an insight into the Hamilton music scene and its play ers in years gone by.

Some of the players mentioned are still active AFM members and some of the venues are still in operation while others are not. I've always enjoyed talking to musicians with long and varied experience. Their insights and advice are always interesting and beneficial. I posed ten questions to Matt. Here are his responses. He prefaced his answers by pointing out that his playing gigs were confined to "jazz, vocalists and standards in big band and small group venues".

- 1. Are you a native Hamiltonian ? If so, what part of town did you grow up in ?
 - I was born in Hamilton and grew up in the west end.
- 2. What or who first got you interested in becoming a musician?
 - My mother. She played and also sang.
- 3. What instrument(s) do you play?
 - Piano and vibraphone
- 4. Who were a few of your early influences, mentors and/or teachers?
 - Art Tatum, Oscar Peterson, Nat Cole
- 5. How old were you when you first joined Local 293?
 - Eighteen
- 6. Do you recall your first paying gig?
 - I subbed for the piano player in Bobby Emerson's band at the Pier Ballroom on Hamilton Beach.



- Among local players Bill Wasylenky, Darcy Hepner and Mike Malone stand out. A few of the outstanding touring players I was lucky enough to work with are Buddy DeFranco, Marion McPartland and Gerry Mulligan.

- 8. What are some of your favourite venues clubs, concert halls or theatres in Hamilton or out of town that are particularly memorable?
 - In town Hamilton Place and CHCH-TV while out of town Massey Hall, Basin Street and the Colonial Tavern were stand outs.
- 9. Who were some of the great touring acts or bands that you had a chance to see when they played in the area?
 - Count Basie, Woody Herman, Tony Bennett and Duke Ellington
- 10. With your great experience and the accolades that have come your way over the years, do you feel you might want to impart some advice or recommendations to young players just getting started in the music business?
 - With the massive changes that have taken place over the last few decades, the music business is not just "music" any more. Entertainment is now the magic word so that it seems you must be multi-talented to survive. It's hard to be original but that's what it takes to be successful today.

Thanks to Matt for answering our little questionnaire. Hopefully we all now know him a little better and when you run into him at a general meeting or Local 293 function you will take the time to introduce yourself and make his acquaintance.

Report of the 2nd Vice-President



I started working at the Hamilton Musicians Guild in 1975 as an administrative assistant. The Local had approximately 1,800 members at the time. Jim Begg (my father) was Secretary-Treasurer, Mary Begg (my mother) Jackie Patton and I worked in the office. Around 1985 I ran for the Board and subsequently was elected as Secretary-Treasurer and served in that position until 1994.

In 2007 I was again elected to the Board as I felt I could play a small role in rebuilding the Local after the difficulties created by the previous President. It has been my honour and privilege to serve the members since then. There was a lot of hard work done to restore the Local by reaching out to the members and community. I am pleased to be the member's voice at the table on the Hamilton Music Advisory Team and the Arts Advisory Commission with Hamilton City Hall.

We've had some great successes. We hosted the Canadian Conference in Hamilton in 2017 where over 50 of our members performed various concerts at the Sheraton Hotel. We were able to get the Opera Hamilton musicians the money owed to them to the tune of over \$20,000.00 by lobbying Councilor Tom Jackson to request a grant from Hamilton City Hall to cover this cost. We participated in the Mayor's Task Force on Economic Recovery which led to the fair pay for musician's legislation that uses our scales. We reinvented the Bob Pedler Memorial Fund event that raises money to process grants for musicians who aren't able to perform. During the pandemic, Secretary-Treasurer Brent Malseed and President Larry Feudo worked very hard to have the streaming concerts through the Music Performance Trust Fund which gave employment to 129 members and I have to say I am very proud of the work that has been done on all achievements.

In 2019, I was elected as Secretary-Treasurer of the Canadian Conference of Musicians which is the group that represents all the Locals in Canada. I would like to thank Canadian Conference President Paul LeClair, Vice-President Doug Kuss and the whole Executive Board for their support during my term.

The music industry is interesting and diverse and I am pleased to say that over the years, I have had some interesting and diverse experiences working with musicians and the general public and those are memories that I will cherish forever. However it is now time to start a new and interesting path to retirement and I have decided that I will not be running in the upcoming election as 2nd Vice President.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the members for their support over the years. I would also like to thank International President Ray Hair, International Secretary-Treasurer Jay Blumenthal, and Vice-President from Canada Allan Willaert for their continued belief in the ability of our Local to continue to grow and prosper. I have great confidence that the incoming Board will follow on the path of prosperity and be the voice in the community that will strongly represent and benefit our members.

Hamilton Musicians' Music Festival provides rare paid gigs for local artists

24 local acts stream Free live performances Over 12 days in July

The pandemic has been particularly hard on musicians. Live concerts were one of the first casualties of the lockdowns and they will likely be the last to fully open up.

"It has been just horrible," says Larry Feudo, president of the Hamilton Musicians Guild (Local 293 American Federation of Musicians). "It's an existential dilemma for these people. What the heck am I doing if I can't play?"

Feudo estimates the local guild's paid membership has declined by more than 200 during the past 18 months, dropping from more than 700 to less than 500. Some have had to sell their instruments to help pay rent.

"First they sell their cases, then they sell their guitars," says Feudo, who also plays guitar in the band Trickbag. "I've seen it happen lots."

To help ease the pain, the local guild has organized a series of 24 free online concerts, streamed live from the stage of The Casbah nightclub in downtown Hamilton over the next three weeks. Feudo says about 125 local musicians will be involved in The Hamilton Musicians' Music Festival, all receiving payment above union scale.

"It's an opportunity for these people to make some money and get their chops back," Feudo says.

All but one of the shows, available for viewing on the guild's Facebook page (facebook.com/local293musicians), start at noon or 3 p.m., two bands a day on 12 different dates. (Popular Hamilton funk band The Beelays has a 6 p.m. start on Wednesday, July 28.) The one-hour concerts feature a wide variety of acts, including jazz (Mike Malone Quintet, Troy Harmer Band, Paul Mitchell Group), Celtic/folk rock (The Steel City Rovers, Quell the Swell), blues (Trickbag, Smoke Wagon Blues Band), indie pop (Basement Revolver) and rock (Backlash, Tim Gibbons and the Swampbusters).

Funds for the shows have come from a variety of donors, including the New York-based Recording Industry's Music Performance Trust Fund, the American Federation of Musicians Freelance Co-Funding Program, Long and McQuade, Findlay Law, IPC Securities, Picks and Sticks and the Friends of Richard Newell.

The shows started Monday, with performances by the Adrean Farrugia Quintet and Suzanne O'Davis, continue Tuesday with Tuba 4 (noon) and Soul Cats. The final shows of the series take place on Friday, July 30, with performances by The Smoke Wagon Blues Band (noon) and Hamilton's Bucket List.

The guild had initially attempted to stage the festival in April and again in June, but was thwarted both times by stringent lockdown rules.

"This is our third kick at the can," Feudo says. "We've been planning this for about a year. Trying to organize this has been a Herculean task."

Feudo is encouraged by the fact that the province is entering Stage 3 reopening on July 16, which allows for some restricted concerts. He adds, however, it may be some time before things return to normal.

"It's all pretty iffy right now," he says. "Everybody is unclear about reopening procedures. Nobody seems to have a good handle on it."





New policy ensures fair wage for musicians at city of Hamilton-led events



Pay the piper, people . . . and the guitarist, the French horn player, yes, even the crazy drummers. Maybe especially them.

Musicians shouldn't have to ask for a fair wage but too often they have to shout because there's a misconception that music is so much fun it's its own reward. You try rupturing your embouchure trying to hit F sharp over high C on a trumpet and say how much fun it is; plus you can't eat fun.

So, a laudatory crash of the cymbals and a hearty tantara for the City of Hamilton, for formalizing fair payment of


musicians who perform at "City-led" events, something council did on June 23 by enacting the Musicians Fair Payment Policy which supports and increases community awareness of the importance of paying musicians fairly.

The policy is meant not only to prop up reliable and respectable payment for one of the most important services provided in our culture — music, especially live music — but also to raise general awareness of the value of the work musicians do, especially performances.

The policy ensures musicians hired for City-led events are paid, at minimum, the current minimum annual rates established by the Canadian Federation of Musicians who are represented locally by the Hamilton Musicians Guild Local 293.

Those rates vary by circumstance and venue but \$200 and above per musician per performance is a benchmark of fairness.

"We were very instrumental in getting that policy through, no pun intended," says Larry Feudo, guitarist for the popular Hamilton band Trickbag and president of Local 293.



"So we're very happy the city is doing this. It is the first city in North America that has committed to being fair and properly compensating. It is a formal recognition of the value we bring to the community."

The policy defines "City-led events" as those that are led and organized by City staff; events directed by Council or under the guidance of boards or committees; and/or when the City contracts a third party to oversee an event. Fair wages for performance has been a central plank in the recommendations of the Hamilton Music Advisory Team (HMAT) as they guided development of Hamilton's Music Mondays series (suspended during COVID) and it was also endorsed in the 2020 Mayor's Task Force for Economic Recovery Report.

"If you've worked in the industry you've either experienced yourself or heard about the unfortunate situation where musicians are asked to perform for free or being pitched that their payment is simply the exposure, they get from having an audience," says Tricia LeClair, chair of HMAT.

"Having fair payment for musicians formalized at the City level goes a long way in demonstrating and modelling the actions that show that the City understands and supports musicians."

"We must set the example and lead with payment that fairly reflects the professional work and service musicians provide," says Mayor Fred Eisenberger. "I'm proud and encouraged by the steps that Hamilton continues to take in recognizing the importance of the music industry's workers and businesses."

According to HMAT research, Hamilton is ranked seventh among cities in the word for the number of independent musicians per capita, and we are number one in the country as a top destination for music-related occupations, according to the Creative Industries profile.

In 2018, the City of Hamilton was recognized as the first Canadian municipality to be awarded a special SOCAN Licensed to Play designation. This designation supports fair compensation for recorded music from musicians and music creators.


"The median income of creative industries workers is \$36,000 a year, as referenced by 2016 Stats Canada data via Creative Industries Sector Profile," says the City in its release.

The new Musicians Fair Payment Policy aligns with existing City of Hamilton policies such as the Fair Wage Policy and Fair Wage Schedule on all construction contracts with the City as well as the Street Performance Policy and Guidelines allowing for "busking" on City property.

The policy does not apply to events that receive City funding (i.e. City Enrichment Fund); community-led events held on City property; or events where a musician or music group create their own event or clearly donate this service.
